

Science fills Corsini square in Tarragona with nearly 5,000 participants at the European Researchers' Night

Around 250 researchers from URV and the CERCA research centers in Tarragona offered about fifty proposals over two days to bring science closer to the public.

The seventh edition of the European Researchers' Night once again sparked the curiosity and interest of families, who did not miss their annual appointment at Corsini Square in Tarragona. About 5,000 people visited the workshop fair organized this Friday and Saturday by more than 250 researchers from the Universitat Rovira i Virgili and the research institutes in the region: ICAC, ICIQ, IISPV and IPHES.

This was the main event of the European Researchers' Night, a public event aimed at popularizing science that takes place simultaneously in more than 300 European cities and has been organized in the Tarragona region since 2018.

The workshop fair offered about fifty diverse activities, allowing children and their families to explore various scientific disciplines in an experimental, fun, and understandable way. But most importantly, they were able to do so alongside the researchers who work on these topics every day.

ICAC-CERCA participated with three workshops to introduce the public to the Roman world from the perspective of trade, craftsmanship, and daily life, with Maria Rueda, Marta Flórez, Ada Richaud and Jordi Oliver.





The GIAP group's proposal was the workshop "Roman Flavors: Discovering Food from the Past," where participants learned recipes from ancient Rome and the variety of ingredients used for cooking at that time, along with the origins of these foods and the trade networks of the era.
